Home health care is a wide range of health care services that may be provided in the home setting for an illness or injury. For a patient to qualify for home health (HH) services they must have a skilled need and be home-bound (per the definition of Medicare). This educational activity reviews mandatory documentation components in the home health start of care process essential for reimbursement, ensuring the patient's eligibility for services and developing an individualized plan of care to meet the person's needs.
